IN THE COURSE OF HUMAN EVENTS



The title of this article, as well as the title of my latest sermon series, draws some inspiration from the Declaration of Independence, but I don't want us to be taken too far down that road. Rather, as a general observation of the unfolding of human experience, the Scriptures are replete with stories of people encountering God in everyday ways, in the course of human events...

There's a mysterious cycle to God's interaction with humanity. In the book of Genesis, we sometimes see God in a very active mode, creating and calling individuals by name and moving in powerful ways. Then, there are seasons when God seems to step back and let events unfold. While the stories of Isaac and Jacob and Joseph do not completely remove God as an actor, much of the plot unfolds within ordinary human struggles for survival. God never steps completely out of the picture and abandons humanity to its own devices (heaven forbid!), but the Scriptures are honest that sometimes it's hard to find God's word.

In your life, you might experience these cycles as well. Often in times of great change, such as graduation or marriage or the birth of children, a change of job or retirement, or a big move to a new place, we feel God's hand near us. We sense God's guidance and the hand of providence opening doors for us. And other times, when life is just going along in its own direction, perhaps even going a little sideways, we may wonder if God is still there because we don't feel those dramatic movements.

The book of Samuel is an interesting study in the unfolding of God's story in the midst of a very human story. It's a book full of imperfect individuals thrust into situations for which they aren't prepared. Hannah had to calm her anxieties before she could conceive a child.

...imporfect individuals thrust into situations for which they aren't prepared. Samuel is called to be God's priest and prophet while just a little boy. David was the least likely to be named the future king of Israel. It's a book that honestly recounts the awkward dance between the nation of Israel and the Lord. It's a book that reminds us of the everyday struggles of infertility, answering God's call, and learning to be faithful to God even in the lull times of life.

I invite you to join in worship each Sunday as we explore this book of 1 Samuel, and as we do so I hope you'll explore your own story as well. How has God answered your simplest prayers? How is God calling you to be a faithful witness? How does God bring you peace in the anxieties of your day-to-day world? You may not feel prepared, but the book of 1 Samuel reminds us that most people do not feel prepared, either. We hear the call, we follow in faith, and we trust that God is at work whatever the circumstances. Let us awaken to what God is doing for and through us!

Storm Season Officially Begins

Store at least one emergency contact under the name "In Case of Emergency" or "ICE" on all mobile phones and devices so your emergency contact can be identified if needed. Be sure your emergency contact is aware of any medical issues or other requirements you may have.

"Ana" has already made her appearance, and disappearance in the Atlantic, but it's still early enough in the season to make sure your storm season plans are caught up, updated, and shared with those who need to know. Here are a few quick ideas to get your communication plan in place.

- HOUSEHOLD INFORMATION Write down phone numbers and email addresses for those in your household or those whom you may need to contact in case you don't have your mobile device with you, or the battery has run down.
- SCHOOL, CAREGIVER, WORKPLACE PLANS Discuss plans with those in your household about how messages will be shared, who might be picked up in an emergency, who will follow alerts and warnings, and how those will be shared with the household.
- OUT-OF-TOWN CONTACT: Who outside of your immediate community or state will act as a central point of contract? During a disaster, it might be easier to make a long-distance call than one across town.
- EMERGENCY MEETING PLACES Decide on safe, familiar places where your family can meet to reunite or for protection. If you have pets, make sure they are animal-friendly. Make sure everyone in your household knows these places, and how to get there.
 - Indoor Where is the safe place in your home in the event of a high-wind storm? Select a small, interior, windowless room on the lowest level of a sturdy building.
 - **Neighborhood** Where would you meet if there is a fire or other emergency and you need to leave your home? This could be a big tree, a certain lamppost or mailbox, or a neighbor's house.
 - Broader Area- If a disaster happens while you're away, and you can't get back home, this is where your family would meet. It might be a library, your church, or a family friend's home.
 - Outside the Area If your area is told to evaculate, or you are unable to get back to your neighborhood or meeting area, an out-of-town meeting place can help you reunite. Consider various routes and modes of transportation for getting there.



If you are using a mobile phone, a text message may get through when a phone call will not, due to its lower **BEST** bandwidth requirements. Your text may also save and go automatically when capacity become available.
