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WHAT A DIFFERENCE A WEEK MAKES



So, we started Lent last week with an invitation to get outside and get some fresh air. "This Lent," I proclaim, "we're on pilgrimage!"

And, it just so happened that the very day I was trying to send everyone outside for a walkabout, we were reeling from subfreezing temperatures. So much for planning, but I think we're used to changing plans given everything that has happened over the last year.

I was thankful for the warming temperatures that moved in over the weekend, so I was finally able to get outside and take advantage of meditative movement. My preferred mode of movement is, not surprisingly, by bike. And, over the weekend, I discovered a new route: now that the brand new Rouzan development off of Perkins connects Southdowns to the Pollard-Woodchase area, I have a whole new section of the city open for exploration!

And then, I flatted a tire. Rolling over a little-used section of sidewalk along Perkins, I suddenly heard the dreaded hiss of air escaping from my front tire. In less than 15 seconds I was rolling on the rim. Glass, thorn, sharp rock — I have no idea what it was that punctured the tube through my extra-tough "Gatorskin" tires (seriously, that's what they're called), but I have to admit, sitting on a grassy side of the road, in full, warm sunlight, changing my tire wasn't nearly as aggravating as you think it would be. As it was, in 10 minutes time, I changed the tube, mounted the tire, aired up the wheel and was off to finish my ride, no worse for the wear. In contrast, had it been a car tire to change, I'm sure I would have been a hot-mess for the rest of the day.

After a year of being told to stay in and stay home, it's nice to feel movement and motion, even if it's liable to some irregularity like a flat tire. And in contrast to my drives around town, which always have a particular destination and purpose, it's nice to go and not be concerned with arrival times and delays. This is part of the essence of pilgrimage; as we sing in the hymn *Lead On, O Cloud of Presence*, "...the journey is our home."

Reflecting on Abraham, Sarah, and Hagar's journey from Haran to Canaan, we would need more than 10 fingers and 10 toes to count all the "flats" they encountered. Hagar suffered at the whim of Sarah's jealousies: sent away twice from a place of safety, a single mother who learned to trust in the "God who sees" her predicament. Sarah, herself, sometimes seems dragged along, enduring Abraham's religious experience second hand and feeling forced to make questionable compromises. And Abraham, whose character waffles between humble trust and fearful control-freak, had to deal with encounters with hostile peoples, a fear that the Pharaoh would murder him for his wife, a nephew who wasn't afraid of taking the choicest piece of land, and, of course, the delay of God's promise to give him a son. Time after time, the story of Abraham, Sarah, and Hagar finds them sitting on the side of a desert road, wondering how to get their life's course back on the road. And time after time, when there seems to be no way through, the story leads them to a deeper trust that God is faithful to open a way.

Think about it — the Bible is full of "begats." The author of Genesis could have just said, "Abraham moved to the land of Canaan and begat Isaac," and left it at that. But the author gives us chapters of stories of the ups and downs of their life path. As much as their story is about the "destination" of God delivering on his promise with Isaac, their story is also about their winding life journey, with many examples for us to learn from as we probe the mystery of what our life's journey is about.

We know that Holy Week and Easter will be the destination of our Lenten pilgrimage. But we have some weeks to go. Meantime, as much as we are able, let us learn to enjoy the ride. God is our destination, and God is a life-long companion.
